## **Home Learning (Homework) Policy**

#### Rationale

At Sandy Lane Primary School we pursue our vision of 'Taking Pride in our Achievements'. This is made effective by our commitment to working in partnership with parents. This policy will form part of the home/school partnership.

#### **Aims**

The undertaking of regular Hor

Home Learning helps children to develop the skills of independent learning;
encouraging self discipline and motivation and personal organisation;
Home Learning informs Parent/Carers and enables them to have direct involvement
in their children's learning;
Home Learning increases Parent/Carers' understanding of the content and level of
their children's work;
Home Learning helps prepare older children for secondary transfer;
Home Learning informs teacher of children's progress when applying learning to
other tasks.

#### **Guidelines**

# Frequency and Amount

Our most recent Parent Survey informed us that many parents feel that homework is an essential part of school life, that it can help prepare children for high school and lifelong learning. Conversely, the survey also informed us that many parents feel that homework is an unwanted pressure; that children should be able to unwind; that many children have other extra-curricular activities of more importance and that homework can cause unnecessary extra work for the whole family.

At Sandy Lane Primary School, we aim to strike the right balance. As such it is important that our expectations in terms of frequency and amount set are reasonable and realistic and do not negatively impact on children's well-being and home life.

This policy, therefore, sets a sensible amount of work to be completed. It covers all years from Reception to Year 6. It should be noted that the guidelines given in Appendix 1 are general and there may be variations at different times of the year, as teachers match the Home Learning to the needs of their class, and of individuals.

At Sandy Lane Primary School, there are no consequences for not completing homework

#### Types of Home Learning at Sandy Lane Primary School

We expect all children to read at home as close to every day as possible.

Children also have activities set as set out in Appendix 1

Pupils may also be given a sheet of activities linked to their Enquiry Curriculum/Topic. These are optional extension tasks.

Where children are unable to access or complete homework at home, where possible they will have paper versions of homework sent home and/or access to a 'homework club' one afternoon after school. Although staff will be present to aid children, these are not extra tuition sessions. Children will also have access to any necessary ICT equipment in this club or one lunchtime in school per week.

#### Responsibilities

### Teachers should ensure that:

- Home Learning is planned and set according to the guidelines in this policy;
- Work matches, as far as possible, the abilities of the children;
- Information about the task is communicated to the children and parents;
- Information about when Home Learning is set and what may be set is communicated to parents
- They encourage and expect children to complete tasks by appropriate deadlines
- Home learning completion is monitored by teachers
- Provide paper copies of computer based homework if asked and when feasible to supply

#### Parents should ensure that:

- They show interest in their child's Home Learning and praise/ value efforts made by the child to complete it;
- Children are supported with their Home Learning, where necessary;
- The work, where applicable, is completed and returned to the school at the appropriate time.
- The teacher is informed if there is a specific reason why the work has not been carried out
- Any observations or issues are passed on to class teacher

### Supporting parents to support their child/ children

We help parents feel welcome in school and part of their child's learning, but also to provide tips and ideas to help parents to support their child at home. To aid this we hold different learning workshops giving insight into children's curriculum.

There are also learning showcases where parents can see their children's work in class.

Parents have a formal opportunity to meet with Class Teachers three times a year in the parent/carer evenings.

# Communication

Home Learning will be discussed as part of Meet the Teacher events during the first term of the new school year, making expectations, roles and responsibilities clear.

Parents are encouraged to communicate observations, comments, concerns etc. about the Home Learning to the teacher.

Whole School Projects may be set but will be accompanied by a sheet explaining what is required, how the work will be marked and presentational ideas. This work will be celebrated in assembly and through display.

Feedback to children on Home Learning completed will be given, where appropriate, to individuals, groups or to the whole class. Not all Home Learning will be marked formally but class teachers will monitor it.

# Appendix 1

In addition to the below, year groups may set a project homework linked to their topic/enquiry curriculum. Details would be sent with this homework but completion of these is entirely optional.

Reading is hugely important in all areas of life which is why we set reading as a daily task. We do realise, however, that this is sometimes not feasible.
